Mr. Robert J. Carey serves as the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense (Information Management, Integration and Technology) / Department of Defense Deputy Chief Information Officer. Selected to this position after a brief tour as Director of Strategy and Policy for the US TENTH FLEET / FLEET CYBER COMMAND his principle roles will be to help lead the consolidation of Defense information technology enterprise as well as align, strengthen and manage the office of the DoD Chief Information Officer to have it better serve the Department's mission.

From November 2006 to September 2010 he served as served as the fifth Department of the Navy (DON) Chief Information Officer (CIO) where he championed transformation, enterprise services, the use of the internet, and information security. In his new role, he will also help strengthen the enterprise architecture, network and information security and help lead the IT workforce into the 21st century.

Mr. Carey entered the Senior Executive Service in June 2003 as the DON Deputy Chief Information Officer (Policy and Integration) and was responsible for leading the DON CIO staff in developing strategies for achieving IM/IT enterprise integration across the Department.

Mr. Carey's Federal service began with the U.S. Army at Aberdeen Proving Ground in October 1982 where he worked as a Test Director for small arms and automatic weapons. He began his service with the Department of the Navy in February 1985 with the Naval Sea Systems Command. He worked in the Anti-Submarine/Undersea Warfare domain where he served in a variety of engineering and program management leadership positions within the Acquisition Community, culminating in his assignment as the Deputy Program Manager for the Undersea Weapons Program Office. Mr. Carey joined the staff of the DON CIO in February 2000, serving as the DON CIO eBusiness Team Leader through June 2003. During this period he also served as the Director of the DON Smart Card Office from February through September 2001.

Mr. Carey attended the University of South Carolina where he received a Bachelor of Science degree in engineering in 1982. He earned a Master of Engineering Management degree from the George Washington University in 1995. He has been a member of the Acquisition Professional Community and has been awarded the Department of the Navy Distinguished Civilian Service Award (twice) as well as the Superior and Meritorious Civilian Service Awards, and numerous other performance awards. He received the prestigious Federal 100 Award in 2006, 2008 and 2009 recognizing his significant contributions to Federal information technology. Mr. Carey was also named Department of Defense Executive of the Year for 2009 by Government Computer News.

Mr. Carey is an active member of the United States Navy Reserve and currently holds the rank of CAPTAIN in the Civil Engineer Corps. He was recalled to active duty for Operation Desert Shield/Storm and Operation Iraqi Freedom, where, in 2006-2007, he served in the Al Anbar province with I Marine Expeditionary Force.

### ASSISTANT SECRETARY, CYBERSECURITY AND COMMUNICATIONS, DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY

Michael W. Locatis joined the Department of Homeland Security as Assistant Secretary of Cybersecurity and Communications in April 2012.

In his role, he will work collaboratively with public, private, and international partners to ensure a safe and secure cyberspace with a focus on protecting Federal and critical infrastructure networks. His team will also coordinate and provide support for a resilient communications system for Federal, State, local, tribal, and territorial governments and critical infrastructure personnel.

Most recently, he served as the Chief Information Officer (CIO) for the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), where he was the principal information management advisor to the Secretary of Energy and the senior IT and cybersecurity official for the DOE. Mr. Locatis promoted Department-wide innovation and effective operations by engaging stakeholders across the entire DOE complex. Through collaboration with national laboratories, program executives, DOE Federal information management staff and contractors, external agency partners and strategic industry partners, he established strategy, policy, direction and a skilled workforce that best support DOE's mission and objectives. In recognition for his leadership Mr. Locatis was a recent recipient of the 2012 Federal 100 Award – recognizing him for the development of the DOE Joint Cybersecurity Coordination Center (JC3), which applies a proactive approach to risk management policy enterprise-wide and vastly improves situational awareness, incident management and cross-agency collaboration.

Mr. Locatis also assumed several leadership roles to help drive government-wide transformation. He served on the Federal CIO Council as a member of the Executive Committee and as co-chair of the Management Best Practices Committee. Mr. Locatis served as a member of both the President's Domestic Policy Council's Strong Cities Strong Communities (SC2) initiative and the President's Management Advisory Board (PMAB) IT sub-committee.

Mr. Locatis is among the few to have led major transformation initiatives within local, state and federal governments, and has done so in light of extreme budget constraints. Having served as Deputy Chief Information Officer for the State of California, Chief Information Officer for the State of Colorado, and Chief Information Officer for the City and County of Denver, Mr. Locatis comes to DHS with a comprehensive understanding of information management and cybersecurity within the interconnected government ecosystem. Throughout his public career, he has not only achieved rapid culture shifts; he has also led the successful adoption of statutory reform, cloud, consolidation, shared services, workforce reshaping, cybersecurity innovations and 3-1-1 citizen service implementations for mission enablement.

Prior to his work in the public sector, Mr. Locatis held various leadership roles within private-sector information and communications technology companies ranging from successful venture backed start-ups to Fortune 500 corporations.

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
